California Community Hub (Community Hall) is the backbone of an isolated and growing community of California.

California is a very small village where there is nothing available for the residents/young people, all the village has is a local convince store which is very limited as it is. Since the community hall has opened back up everyone has been in high spirits, the village has come together, people have a lovely environment to interact with neighbours and have some companionship, it gives the young people somewhere safe to be rather than hanging around the streets of the village vulnerable!, it would be a very sad thing to lose for everyone of the village. If any resident would like to participate in any of the social activities currently provided by California community hall they will have to commute and not everyone in the village has the ability to commute to other villages in the braes area. The laddies that are running the community hall are doing a fantastic job, very welcoming and are constantly promoting and encouraging people to be involved which is a great thing to see for this village as it is something that has been missing for a number of years!

We also rely on the hub as a way of staying warm with rising fuel costs and no mains gas in California (which makes heating extortionate).

I do not drive and have mental health issues that make it difficult to travel far to enjoy facilities currently provided at the hub therefore this isolates me further.

This community hub has so much to offer people like me in this village who can't drive and it's great to have something so close I can take me and the little one

Worried about my where any kids in area go for groups etc.

I use the hub weekly and volunteer in the hub cafe 2 mornings a week, this provides a place for pensioners to come for there breakfast and to catch up with others, without this facility they will have no where to go to socialise and many will be left house bound as they can't get to other areas for this as public transport is not regular in the village and many can't walk to the bus stop or afford taxis. The kids also have a youth club run out of here one night a week there is nothing in the village for kids to do apart from this. The hub offers many other class and it would be a shame for them to go.
