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Comments from those who identify as having a Protected Characteristic:

A community centre is meant to be the hub of a village community where activities take place Its bad enough Maddiston don't get Xmas tree or lights but to close a building is awful it can be used for many things like a winter warm drop in place for people struggling but all the council want is greedy money.

Would have a huge negative effect on the community use local schools, supply transport to links.

The only community hall up this way. Hosts plenty activities for adults and kids. Big space for events. Near the primary school and playpark.

It would affect all age groups including family members of mine.

My wife and I are leaders at the Senior Youth Club, held in Maddiston Community Education Centre. The Club is run by a group of local volunteers every Friday night (7.00-8.45pm) for secondary aged youth from September to June. The Club has been running at the Centre for 13 years and we have seen a total of about 500 different teenagers attend the Club in this time – the vast majority are from Maddiston. Currently we have 25 teenagers attending regularly. Some of them have significant challenges in their life – family, health, social and behavioural. Some have autism and others have learning difficulties. We do not charge an entry fee. Some families in Maddiston struggle financially and we do not want to exclude any young person. The Centre provides a safe space for them to have fun, meet new friends, learn new skills, and relax. For some, being off the streets means they are away from the influence of under-age drinking, and experimenting with drugs. The Centre is relied on most by young people whose parents have no car or limited finances to access activities elsewhere (e.g. sports centres). If the Centre closed the young people in these families would struggle to participate in activities they enjoy doing at the Club.

My son attends a Jujitsu club at this facility and if it closes the club will be disbanded. What are kids supposed to do?

yes...there is nowhere else for me to go and meet friends.

Comments from those who do not identify as having a Protected Characteristic but have made comments on impact of closure on those who do:

My daughter uses this facility. This is the only facility in Maddiston. There is nothing else here and you intend to close it because you haven't bothered spending money to make it safe. You cannot close these buildings or hand them to the public in the state you are leaving them in, surely that is not okay? Prioritise them and include the rebuild in developers plans. There are a number of housing developers building currently, if you made the building of a new community venue part of the terms, I'm sure that would also encourage local people to support plans. You need to think bigger and long term if you want to get out of the hole you're in.
